God's Gift of Time

A Mountain Top Experience

Getting away to the mountains can have a cathartic experience. We feel renewed just because we have distance from our daily grind. We feel a sense of transcendence, for we are "above it all." Yet, such an experience can be frightening, for we are not in control. Such was the experience of Peter, James and John. They saw Jesus transfigured. They were not in control.

SUNDAY STUDIES

FIRST READING (Gen 22:1-2, 9, 10-13, 15-18): The book of Genesis presents us with a dilemma in the story of Isaac. God's law abhorred human sacrifice, but Abraham heard the divine command to sacrifice his son. What's more important, God's law or God's will?

PSALM (Psalm 116:10, 15-19): Psalm 116 celebrated the safe arrival of a pilgrim to the Temple in Jerusalem. It was a thanksgiving hymn that lauded YHWH for rescue even at the point of death.

SECOND READING (Rom 8:31-34): "If God is with us, who can be against us?" This famous line came from St. Paul's letter to the Romans. This rhetorical question addressed the overwhelming power of God in life, a power so great even death could not get in the way.

GOSPEL (Mk 9:2-10): Mark's gospel laid out the classic lines and themes of the Transfiguration. Jesus took Peter, James, and John up the mountain to pray. There, he was transformed. Moses and Elijah joined him. The three followers witnessed the voice of the Father declaring Jesus his Son. They also heard the divine command, "Listen to him."

God's Gift of Talent



Catechism Theme:

The Transfiguration (CCC 554-556)

The Transfiguration was a revelation of the Trinity. The voice from heaven proclaimed the words of the Father. The Son stood transformed in his glory. And the Spirit overshadowed the scene as the cloud. The scene hearkens back to the Baptism, the Father's voice from heaven, the Son rising from the water, and the Spirit descending upon the Son. The difference between the two events, however, lies in the reception of the revelation. In the Baptism, Jesus received the revelation with others as witnesses. In the Transfiguration, the followers received the revelation.

Notice the revelation was in context as confirmation and foreshadowing. The event confirmed Peter's confession. Jesus was the Messiah. But it also foreshadowed the mission of the Messiah, death on the cross to enter glory. The Transfiguration was a look backward and a look forward.

For us, the Transfiguration reminds us of our Baptism when the Trinity revealed themselves to us. And, it is a look ahead to our death and resurrection. Yes, we, too, will be like Christ in glory. But the road to that glory leads down the mountain into the mundane affairs and sufferings of life.

As you look forward to Easter, what expectations do you have? Have your Lenten exercises helped you to anticipate the resurrection? How?

The message of this Gospel is clear. To see, we need to look. To hear, we need to listen. To experience, we need to open our minds and hearts to the possibility of God's voice. Look at the Son. Listen to his words. Open your mind and heart to his presence. We don't need to be on the top of a mountain to experience God's fullness. Just shake off rote and routine. And he will be there.

Take a few moments to reread the Gospel. Imagine you're before the Lord as he speaks to you in his glory. What is his Word to you? How will that Word help you this week on your Lenten journey?

DAILY PRAYER THIS WEEK

This is a pivotal week of Lent. We can solidify the patterns we have begun or we can make a new start, if we haven't been able to get started yet. If we have begun to recognize what needs realigning in our lives and have begun to fast and abstain from some things that get in the way of our relationship with the Lord, then we are engaging in a struggle. We are likely uncovering resistance and experiencing our personal sinfulness face-to-face.

This is all preparing us for a deeper conversion, a readiness for reconciliation with God and the graces that will allow us to be a source of reconciliation with others. This is the time when we begin to see and experience how much God loves us at a new and more personal level. These graces prepare us to keep our eyes focused on Jesus in the weeks ahead - to learn from him, to fall in love with him more deeply and to be drawn to imitate him more completely. If we are just getting started with our Lenten journey, renewing our desires for these graces will be all we need to begin with a renewed openness. God does not need a lot of time to convince us of his love for us.
