DIOCESE OF HONOLULU CALLS FOR PERMANENT DEACONS!

The Diocese of Honolulu is seeking men to become permanent deacons. Interested men (and their wives for those who are married) are required to attend an inquiry weekend at St Stephen Diocesan Center (SSDC) in Kaneohe. Scheduled weekends are:

- March 12-14, registration deadline March 5
- April 9-11, registration deadline April 2
- May 14-16, registration deadline May 7
- June 11-13, registration deadline June 4

Applications to enter the formation program will be accepted after attendance at one of the inquiry weekends. The formation cohort, consisting of the candidates and their wives, will undergo five years of intense classroom and hands-on experiences, generally one weekend per month at SSDC, designed to prepare the men for a life of pastoral service and liturgical responsibilities.

Family Activity The Character Game

Jesus threw the money changers and sellers out of the Temple. The common people saw his actions as the fulfillment of their hopes for the Messiah, who would reform the corrupt leadership of the Temple. Of course, the Temple leadership saw his intrusion as an attack on their vendors. And for his attack, Jesus would pay the ultimate price: his death.

Jesus was willing to make a stand on a principle and suffer the consequences. Willingness to stand on principle despite the costs reveals strength of character. To stress this point with your family, play the "Character Game." Create three questions for discussion about issues of moral principle. For example, you found a \$20.00 bill on the sidewalk. What do you do: keep it or find the owner? Why? Would Jesus do the same thing? Why? Use discussion on these questions to introduce the reading from John. (word-sunday.com)

God's Gift of Talent



The Third Week of Lent

For the **Third Sunday of Lent** we read the Ten Commandments and witness Jesus driving the money changers out of the temple. He says, "Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up." **John's Gospel** tells us the point: "Therefore, when he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this, and they came to believe the Scripture and the word Jesus had spoken."

Jesus challenges the people in his hometown of Nazareth to look at him in a new way - "No prophet is accepted in his own native place." In a fury, they drive him out of the temple. Peter asks Jesus the limits of forgiveness. Jesus says that we must forgive again and again. He tells the parable about the servant, who though forgiven himself, does not forgive his fellow servants. Jesus has come to fulfill the law and the words of the prophets, not abolish someone claimed that Jesus must be them. When using Satan's power to heal, Jesus responds "Every kingdom divided against itself will be laid waste and house will fall against house." When asked to name the "greatest" commandment, Jesus names two, thus putting together the necessity of loving God with our entire being and loving our neighbor as our very selves. The week ends as Jesus tells a powerful story of the Pharisee and the tax collector praying in the temple. I tell you, the latter went home justified, not the former; for everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and the one who humbles himself will be exalted.

For the **Fourth Sunday of Lent** we read Jesus' words to Nicodemus in the **Fourth Gospel**. Jesus will be lifted up on the cross to heal us from the power of sin and death. This gospel, which is written like a trial, tells us the verdict. "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life."


