God's Gift of Time


Discipleship had real dangers. To become a follower, one must fulfill two conditions: give up all claims and be ready to die. Jesus meant releasing claims on conflicting personal relationships and be ready to undergo persecution. In other words, to become a Christian meant leaving one's non-believing clan for the Christian community. Giving up family brought group ostracization and backlash, both on the family level and the neighborhood level. Depending upon the poor and lowly Christian community alone had its own dangers. (Consider Acts 8:1-3, for example.)

Cultural Christianity has its comforts. But, living the Christian life has its challenges. Have people criticized you for your virtue, prayer life, or faith practices? How?

"You are the Christ!"

Peter had his expectations and his vision of commitment. He wanted a Messiah to lead to glory among people. But Jesus had different expectations and vision of commitment. Jesus' vision would lead to shame among people but glory before God. When we proclaim Jesus the Christ, let us remember the responsibility those words bring. And the risks those words bring. In the end, they will not make us popular or comfortable. But they will bring us to eternal life.

Reflect on Peter's proclamation. How can you proclaim Jesus as the Christ this week? How can you live the message, in spite of the dangers? (word-sunday.com)



God's Gift of Talent



Twenty-fourth Week in Ordinary Time

On the **Twenty-fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time** we hear in **Mark's Gospel** as Jesus tell his disciples about his passion, death and resurrection to come in Jerusalem. Peter tries to prevent him from going there. Jesus rebukes him and tells the disciples and us that to be a disciple is to follow him, not trying to save one's life, but by dying to ourselves and losing ourselves for his sake and that of the Gospel. That is the only path to real life.

Monday is the Memorial of Saint John Chrysostom, Bishop and Doctor of the Church. Tuesday is the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross and Wednesday is the Memorial of Our Lady of Sorrows. Both days have their own special readings. Thursday is the Memorial of Saints Cornelius, Pope, and Cyprian, Bishop, Martyrs.

We continue reading from Paul's **First Letter to Timothy.** It begins this week with the great prayer for our leaders. He then says how bishops and deacons should behave. He urges Timothy to be especially caring for the youth. Paul warns Timothy of the troubles of riches. Finally, Paul encourages Timothy to be faithful.

In Luke's Gospel, Jesus praises the faith of the Roman centurion who understands Jesus' power to heal. Jesus then raises from the dead the son of the widow of Nain. In response to constant criticism from religious authorities, Jesus compares the critics to children taunting their playmates. We read of the woman who entered a dinner Jesus was attending and wept over his feet, washing them with her tears, showing what real love is. Luke, who highlights the role of women in his gospel, tells us of women who accompanied Jesus and his disciples. Finally, Jesus gives us the Parable of the Sower and its interpretation about how temptations and shallow roots can prevent the Word from growing in us or how "the anxieties and riches and pleasures of life" can choke the Word.

On the **Twenty-fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time** we hear Jesus tell his disciples about his passion, death and resurrection a second time. It is clear to him that they didn't understand the first time. He knew that, along the way, they had been arguing about who was the greatest. He gathers the Apostles and says to them, "If anyone wishes to be first, he shall be the last of all and the servant of all." (word-sunday.com)

Family Activity (Mk 8:27-35) "Being A Christian" Poster

Many scholars believe these passages signify the transition point in Mark's gospel. No longer does Jesus hide the fact he is the Messiah. Indeed, he proclaims the type of Messiah he will be, a Suffering Servant. This message takes Peter and the others completely by surprise. Wasn't he to be the One to lead God's army against the Romans? Wasn't he to be the One to rule as God's Chosen in Jerusalem forever? Of, course, Peter and the others missed the point.

Jesus revealed the true meaning of "Christ" and "Christian." Both mean "selflessness." Both mean sacrifice. To make this point, create a poster labeled "Being a Christian." Have your family draw a winding road to the cross. Then, brainstorm and write down ways to be selfless as road signs on the way to the cross. Place the poster in a place all can see. Use it to generate discussion during the week. (word-sunday.com)
